

MAY GUEST SPEAKER – ASTRID PETERS



Humber Nurseries – If you have lived in Brampton for any length of time then you know Humber Nurseries. Astrid Peters is the daughter of the founders and has written a book Sibylla, One Story At A Time – Her book explores the trials of moving to Canada and establishing a successful nursery.

Our May guest speaker is Astrid Peters. She is the daughter of the founders of Humber Nurseries and she writes....

"Sibylla, One Story at a Time" is the culmination of two different research efforts. The first was intended as a family genealogy project, with the goal of producing a manuscript which would be given only to Sibylla's children and grandchildren. The second was the daunting task of getting the memoir published.

While a family history, the book is also a document where Sibylla and her husband Frans, as immigrants to Canada in the post Second World War era, laid the foundation for their beautiful garden centre, Humber Nurseries Ltd. in Brampton.

In 2020, this same nursery was reconstituted as Humber Nurseries 2020 Ltd. in Caledon all in due respect to Sibylla and Frans's succession planning.

One of my presentation goals is to encourage and inspire audience members to write about themselves, whether it be in a journal, or in research of family genealogy or even writing the first chapter of a book!



Shari Lapena does such a good job of writing realistic, fast paced books that keep you on your toes with unexpected twists and turns throughout the



Once home to Sir Allan Napier MacNab and his family, today Dundurn Castle tells the story of the family who lived above stairs and the servants who lived and worked below stairs to support their affluent lifestyle. Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cornwall is the museum's Patron and the great, great, great granddaughter of Sir Allan MacNab. Enjoy a delicious lunch at the Olde School House, where her Majesty the Queen dined on one of her visits to Canada. Our next stop is at Canada's only privately run botanical gardens, Whistling Gardens. 
